

You'll be surprised how colorful and unusual some of these flags are!

# Getting started

# LOADING NATIONAL FLAGS INTO COMPUTER MEMORY

- 1. Insert the ATARI BASIC Language Cartridge in the cartridge slot of your computer.
- 2. If you have the cassette version of NATIONAL FLAGS:
  - a. Have your computer turned OFF.
  - b. Turn on your TV set.
  - c. Insert the NATIONAL FLAGS cassette into the program recorder's cassette holder and press REWIND on the recorder until the tape rewinds completely. Then press PLAY to prepare the program recorder for loading the program.
  - d. Turn on the computer while holding down the START key.
  - e. When you hear a beep, release the START key and press the RETURN key. The program will load into computer memory and start automatically.

# <u>If you have the diskette version of NATIONAL</u>

- a. Have your computer turned OFF.
- b. Turn on your disk drive.
- C. When the BUSY light goes out, open the disk drive door and insert the NATIONAL FLAGS diskette with the label in the lower right-hand corner nearest to you. Close the door.
- c. Turn on your computer and TV set. The

program will load into computer memory and start automatically.

#### CHOOSING GAME OPTIONS

You can work on flags from one of five specific geographic regions, or the whole world (with 168 flags chosen in random sequence). Press the OPTION key to change the display from WORLD to each of the regions: the Americas, Europe, Asia-Pacific, Middle East (including the Indian Ocean) and Africa. Then only the flags of that region will be displayed in random sequence.

Press SELECT to choose GAME, SEARCH, or DISPLAY. Each of these is described below.

#### STARTING THE GAME

After you've made your choices, press the START key. The game begins and the flags appear in the middle section of the screen.

#### THREE WAYS TO USE THE PROGRAM

# Display

Flags appear in random order. At the bottom of the screen you see information about the country represented by each flag. You don't have to respond. This is a good way to become familiar with the flags.

### Search

This allows you to display the flags you choose. After you press the START key, you see this prompt:

# SELECT COUNTRY?

Type the name of the country whose flag you wish to see. The program takes up to 30 seconds to

search for your flag.

If a match is found the flag is displayed along with its clues. If the program can't find the country you typed, it displays this prompt:

#### PLEASE CHECK SPELLING

When you're ready to go on to another country's flag, press the SPACE BAR.

## Game

The program displays a flag and this prompt below it:

#### GUESS FLAG 1

Type the country the flag represents and press the RETURN key. (Or, if you have no idea of the country, and want a hint, just press the RETURN key.) If your answer is correct, all the clues for that flag are displayed. If your answer is incorrect you see a clue. The prompt, "GUESS FLAG 1" reappears. Type another answer. If you're wrong, another clue appears. You have a maximum of five guesses. If your fifth try is incorrect, the program gives you the name of the country.

Press the SPACE bar when you're ready to continue with another flag.

#### SCORING

When you're playing the game, your score is displayed at the top of the screen. It's updated after each flag. The number on the left is a cumulative score. The number to the right is a percentage score indicating your success rate so far.

If you guess the correct answer without any help from clues you receive 5 points. For each clue you need, one point is deducted from your score. For

example, one clue scores 4 points, and two clues scores 3 points. If you have five incorrect answers, no points are scored and your percentage drops.

#### CLUES

When you're playing the game, and you need more than one try to answer correctly, the clues are given in this order:

- 1. LOCATION (e.g. Africa)
- 2. POPULATION (in millions)
- 3. CURRENCY (e.g., rupee)
- 4. CAPITAL (e.g. Canberra)

#### LIMITATIONS OF YOUR ANSWERS

You can't use abbreviations (for example, the program won't accept "U.S.S.R." for Soviet Union).

Some countries are known by more than one name, For example, the United Kingdom and Great Britain are both correct answers. But the program doesn't accept "England" since it's a different geographical area with a different flag.

You can also type the name of the country in the major language of that country. For example, instead of Sweden, you can answer with "Sverige".

If a country no longer uses a name, it's incorrect. You can't use Ceylon for Sri Lanka, Siam for Thailand, or Rhodesia for Zimbabwe.

## ACCURACY OF THE GRAPHICS

NATIONAL FLAGS is displayed on a 160 x 78 grid. Stars, circles and diagonal lines are displayed with less resolution than horizontal or vertical lines because of the size and shape of the pixels. Flags also have different dimensions (e.g., 3 X 1 or 8 X 5). They're displayed in proportion.

The edges of the screen are usually black. Colors are chosen as accurately as possible but they may vary with the adjustment of the television set you use.

#### TYPES OF FLAGS

There are many types of flags, such as civil, state, war, civil ensign, state ensign, war ensign, royal, presidential, and prime minister's.

Some countries have as many as four or five national flags for different occasions. Argentina has a civil flag with blue, white and blue horizontal stripes. Its state and war flag has the "Sun of May" in the center. Japan's civil and state flag is a large red disc on a white background. Its war flag is the Rising Sun.

#### SUMMARY OF COUNTRIES AND CLUES

This table is included as a guide to the clues in the program. The facts are constantly changing. Countries adopt new names, populations increase, new currencies circulate, and capitals acquire new names.
